The sub committee is moving forward with updating our constitution to current standards. They have completed their draft and sent it to review for compliance. If there is sufficient interest we can arrange for a spring demonstration on how to operate the pumps.

If you don't want to contribute you have several options including bug suits, repellants, and if you believe the research frequency emitters. If you have allergies please be careful and keep an epipen handy. They have a short shelf life so swap them out every season.

There was a lightning strike on the weekend in the bush on the South shore. MNR was notified. Please ensure that when lightning strikes you are not out on the water. You are the highest point and therefore a target when you are out there.

The response to the Foodcycler was incredible. Thanks to all who contacted me. As of March 7, 100 units were delivered to the Township office. To claim one, you can go to the office during business hours, ask for the model of your choosing, show your ID, pay by cash, debit or cheque and take it home. The Township will be stocking the Foodcycler for several months. I have been using mine every night and have noticed a marked reduction in wet garbage.

The Foodcycler will reduce wet garbage for being carried from your residence, to the transfer station and to the landfill.

Connectivity

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Lightning Safety - Pulled from Cottage Life Magazine



Summer is the prime season for lightning strikes in Canada. According to Environment Canada, the most lightning flashes are likely to occur in July followed by August and June, and each year, lightning kills approximately 10 Canadians and injures about 100 to 150 others. While nothing is fail-proof (and you should never underestimate how dangerous it can be), keeping these safety tips in mind should help minimize your risk of getting struck.

- **1. Check the weather:** Before venturing far from safe shelter (like the cottage), take a look at the weather forecast first. Postpone your trip or activity if there are predictions for thunderstorms, and don't go outside if one hits.
- **2. Get indoors:** The worst place to be during a lightning storm is outdoors, so if you find yourself outside when you hear thunder, follow the 30-30 rule: when you see lightning and then hear thunder less than 30 seconds afterwards, head indoors as soon as possible and be wary of resuming any outdoor activities for at least 30 minutes after the last clap of thunder.
- **3. Unplug your electronics:** If you're inside before a storm hits, disconnect electrical appliances like radios and television sets and avoid touching or using electronic equipment, as lightning can travel through them (except battery-operated appliances—those are okay). Although they're less common nowadays, make sure you don't use corded landline phones (wireless ones are fine). Try to avoid concrete structures because lightning can travel through metal wires or bars in concrete walls or flooring, and if you're outside, keep away from lawnmowers, golf carts and clubs, metal fences, motorcycles, and bicycles—they're all excellent conductors of electricity.
- **4. Avoid water:** Whether you're indoors or outdoors, touching water is dangerous during a lightning storm, so refrain from doing anything that involves coming into contact with it. Lightning can travel through plumbing, so don't do anything that involves water taps like washing the dishes or taking baths or showers during a storm. If you're outside, don't go boating or swimming, and if you're already in the water, get to land as quickly as possible.
- **5. Position yourself properly:** If you do find yourself outside and don't have any safe shelter to get to nearby, don't stand near tall objects or anything made of metal. Avoid being the highest point in an open area (i.e., holding an umbrella or a fishing rod) and crouch low with your feet together, keeping as little of your body touching the ground as possible.



Gerry's Corner-Winter throwback to keep you cool

During the week prior to Christmas Environment Canada advised of potentially heavy snow squall activity to the lee of Georgian Bay. That forecast became a huge reality starting on Dec 17 2022. For those of us who reside permanently on Kapikog Lake the forecast also led us to take our vehicles out from our properties or risk the chance of being stranded till spring.

The snow squall machine ramped up during the night of December 17 and continued off and on right through till Christmas and Boxing Day. Electricity was lost, highway 400 was closed to traffic on occasion and snow fall exceeded a metre on the ground. Off and on rainfall during this time added to the weight of the snow, the heavy moisture laden snow clung to trees. Truly a picturesque winter wonderland. However, that beauty also created problems!

Some trees bent or broke under the snow load causing electrical outages and blockages of roadways. A chainsaw was a must to carry and use in order to get out to our vehicles. Trees had to be cut from the road system in order to allow passage. Getting around was difficult. Trails were

blocked by fallen or bent snow loaded trees. Municipal road crews kept our main road system open and accessible, kudos to them.

Hydro One had 5 two person crews working in the Kapikog area to restore electricity to those that had lost it. Some were without power for a number of days. Hydro helicopters were seen flying the lines for downed trees on the wires. Many of you will find storm damage on your properties when you return, it may be downed trees, broken branches or physical property damage. In any event you will have more of a spring clean up than normal.

This natural winter storm event however has not just caused issues for us as humans. The forest took a real beating; many trees broke under the weight of the snow or toppled over completely due to the strong winds associated with the snowy winter storm. Balsam, white pine and hemlock from saplings to majestic mature trees incurred lots of damage. Wildlife in the area also felt the wrath of this storm. Some turkeys perished due to poor access to food and their roosts being snow laden. Deer movement was heavily curtailed due to the snow depth.

Winter is always a difficult time for wildlife but this storm created hazardous life threatening conditions for them. Luckily a major melt occurred starting on December 28 and lasted till year's end, limiting the loss. For humans living in the area this thaw cycle made movement somewhat more challenging, the snowpack on the seasonal roads became dicey and lake ice conditions were unsafe.

Travel must always be taken with caution! Be aware of the weather, and know what the snow and ice conditions are in the area you intend to travel. Let someone know where you are going and when you expect to be back. Always carry a fully charged cell phone, be aware of your surroundings and be prepared for unexpected hazards.

Update of Association By-laws:

At the last AGM (August 2022), the executive struck a sub-committee to undertake a review and update of the by-laws governing the workings of the association. The current set of by-laws was put into effect in August of 1992, when considerations such as personal information and data privacy were not part of the best practices for cottage associations. We can report now, that the review has been completed and the update is underway. It is expected that the new by-laws will be ready for presentation and ratification at this year's AGM, August 2023.

Continuation of the Water Quality Testing Program:

As part of the association's mandate to ensure and support overall lake health, we will continue our testing program. This year, different from the previous two, the program will not include E.coli testing. In consultation with the Township of the Archipelago and our water testing analyst, the E.coli testing has been determined to be subject to various naturally occurring phenomena (dead and decomposing animal carcasses in or around the water) for which there is little or no mitigation that we can apply. We will focus on clarity, oxygenation levels and low phosphorous as keys to water faulty and lake health. As usual, the test results will be collected and analyzed, and the report published to the membership. We are looking for volunteers to support the water sampling, a boat


