Children's Fun Day Activities! *

Date: August 9th, 2025 (or rain date August 10th)

Time: IPM to 3PM

Location: Township dock parking lot.

At the Chill Out Station there will be cold water and freezies, under a shade tent. Please bring your lawn chairs.

A parent or guardian is to be present with your children during the event.

Unless otherwise indicated, materials and game equipment will be provided for participants.

The following is a list of activity stations.

I.Water Games Station

Sponge Toss Relay: Teams race to soak up water with sponges and fill a bucket as fast as possible. Get wet, get silly, and cheer on your team!

Sponge Toss: Partners toss sponges back and forth, taking a step back with each successful catch. Last sponge standing wins!



Councilor's Message by Dan MacLeod

2025 Property Taxes

Property Land Taxes for Kapikog cottagers will increase by 1.8% this year. This is the lowest increase in the townships that surround Parry Sound.

Budget - How taxes are dispensed

\$0.22 to fund external services (District Social Services Administration Board, OPP, Health Unit, MPAC, Ambulance, Belvedere Heights)

\$0.26 to local school boards

\$0.52 to the Township

Logo

After 45 years of service the old logo has been retired. A new logo was created to better reflect the Archipelago's natural resources. Also with the simpler design, it is not as intricate, is easier to look at and cheaper to create.

Site Alteration and Tree Preservation Bylaws

The final version of these new Bylaws is a balance between the issues they were to solve and not being excessively restrictive, particularly when it comes to tree cutting. If you have a dead tree or one that poses a hazard

Food Cycler Benefits and Landfill Lifespan

Results indicate that the annual volume (waste plus cover material) during 2024 was approximately 500 m3 (17,658 ft3). This is a 29% reduction from the 2023 results which were 700 m3 (24720 ft3).

The decrease in volume may be due to reduced need for cover material, reduced household disposal, reduced construction waste, or increased diversion (i.e. recycling, using the Food Cycler). The volume is at the low end of the previous 5-year range of 500 to 2,300 m3 (17,658 to 81,224 ft3).

The remaining capacity for the site is 19,105 m3 (674,686 ft3) of waste and cover material, which correlates to a lifespan of 17 years, utilizing the 5-year average annual volume of 1,100 m3 (38,846 ft3).

Township staff are working with Azimuth Environmental and the Ministry of Environment, Conservation and Parks (MECP) on optimizing the property to support an additional 40,000 m3 (1,412,586 ft3) of capacity into the future. A pre-consultation meeting remains as MECP has completed a hydrogeologist review but has not yet completed a surface water review. The optimization for additional capacity was initiated in February of 2024.

Waste Disposal Cards

Phragmites

Recently, Georgian Bay Forever (GBF) created a Georgian Bay Phragmites Management Area as part of the Ontario Phragmites Action Program, developed by the Invasive Species Centre through the support of the Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry (MNRF).

The goal of this collaborative effort is to bring together communities, organizations, municipalities, First Nations, and other entities working on Phragmites management around Georgian Bay, to share their knowledge and resources. Throughout the year GBF will facilitate in-person, hybrid, or virtual meetings to go over topics of Phragmites management, invite guest speakers, and have roundtable discussions on successes and challenges being faced by organizations. This was briefly discussed at GBF's recent Council deputation. The Archipelago staff will be active participants in this collaboration, and we also hope to connect GBF to the appropriate Ministry of Transport (MTO) contact to participate in the collaboration, but we are still awaiting a response on who that contact is.

The Georgian Bay Biosphere (GBB), through their consulting service called Generations Effect, has provided a proposal for one week of service to inspect, report, and cut inland phragmites on Healey Lake Road. GBB's staff will take a leadership role but will work closely with Township staff. We have already had one report from a Kapikog resident. Please report any invasive Phragmites, if you happen to see any growing.

Roads

The seasonal road to year-round road assessment and study is in progress to determine if a seasonal road can be upgraded to a permanent one. The final report is scheduled to be introduced in the third quarter.

There will be speed radar signs put out again this year. These signs produce valuable data including quantity of vehicles and speed. I would ask that you do not try for a high score!

Archipelago staff will be clearing the brush from the roads this season, however we do not have the resources to pick up brush from private properties.

Snowmobile Trails

The trail agreement finalized this year, with snowmobile clubs, is a three-year deal. Since an agreement is already in place for this upcoming snowmobile season, there will be no permit- related delays in using the trails.

Bell Fibre Internet Project Update

The hope is to have internet service in our area by this September. Nothing in writing but that is the thought.

Bell Canada's approved vendors for the work done in the Township are Pickard Construction, UTS Consultants, and Mike's Communi-

The Township of The Archipelago advises residents to be aware of service provider impersonation scams. The ongoing work on internet connectivity is exclusively focused on constructing new fiber-based internet infrastructure and does not entail any solicitation for internet services.

There are no financial commitments required from residents to benefit from the provincefunded Accelerated High-Speed Internet Program (ASHIP) aimed at deploying fiber optic internet in the South Archipelago. Mainland work crews have been visible, and new roadside signboards have been placed to engage residents in potential expanded infrastructure on their property. Mike's Communication is associated with Bell's larger undertaking and is a reported subcontractor to Bell Infrastructure. I highly urge Kapikog ratepayers to contact Mike's Communications to ensure the internet infrastructure is brought to your dwelling. This service is free.

The Township of The Archipelago (TOA) continues to offer the Kids in the Biosphere program in partnership with Georgian Bay Mnidoo Gamii Biosphere. This free program provides participating families with activities to keep them outside and learning about nature all summer long. Kids in the Biosphere began in 2013 and has reached over 600 families!

Families within the TOA register with the program at the beginning of summer and pick up an activity kit with ma-

terials and activity instructions. The self-guided activities are designed to last all summer. Beyond nature observation, the activity kits invite families to conduct science experiments, help local species, and take climate action. Families can also complete their activity scorecard and submit photos of their discoveries

throughout the summer.

Activities are mainly self-guided, but there are opportunities for families to interact with Biosphere staff and guest experts.




Humphrey Nature Trail Review by Andrew Sixt

On a sunny spring day, my wife, dog and I decided to explore the Humphrey Nature Trails. The trails are located in the village of Humphrey, behind the Humphrey Fire Hall. Parking is available at the trail head. It's about a 25 minute drive from Kapikog. The map below shows how to get to the parking lot from highway 141.



There are five connected main loops and a short loop as shown on the map.

Our travels started off at the parking lot, where the start of the trail was well marked. In addition, there was a barn that was open, although its primary use appears to be a shelter/warm up place for Nordic skiers and snowshoers in the winter. My wife gave the outhouse a 3 out of 5 star rating (which is pretty good for what I'm accustomed to hearing for public washrooms!).







We followed the Running Deer route and then branched to Moose Tracks. There were nice views of Whitefish Lake and a beaver pond along the Moose Tracks trail, where we stopped for a snack and drink. There was a This trail path was faint and not well marked, so if you are not an experienced bush navigator, I would recommend sticking to the main trail. On our return route, we followed the north branch of the Running Deer route.

We found this to be an enjoyable and easy hike, that was level in most places. Parts of the trail were gravel, near the parking lot, and other sections were earth and rock, with a few muddy sections so appropriate hiking short side trail, marked with dots on the map. footwear is recommended. The trail was easy to follow but I found it useful to take a photo of the map at the entrance for reference.
